PCC continues to put Bedfordshire Police on the map

Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Festus Akinbusoye has continued to put Bedfordshire Police on the global map following visits with French, Chilean and Nigerian officials to discuss policing

In April, the PCC was joined by Bedfordshire Police's stop and search lead, Superintendent Ian Taylor, to meet with civil officers from the Cour des Comptes (Court of Auditors) and Deputy Home Affairs attaché at the French Embassy in London.

The representatives were tasked by French authorities to review and study how police powers such as stop and search are scrutinised in Bedfordshire. The discussions covered use of force, the county's stop and search scrutiny panel and work being completed by the PCC to address race disparity and improve legitimacy.

Later on 3 May, the University of Bedfordshire and Mr Akinbusoye welcomed Departmental Permanent Secretaries and Heads of Services from Nigeria, including senior police and security staff, having received the request from the Nigerian High Commission, and support of Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office.

The planned visit took place as part of a study mission into the latest innovations in policing, security and public service management. Over the course of a week the officials embarked on a short tour of the United Kingdom and selected Bedfordshire as a key location to learn and identify best practice.

PCC asks for local residents' view on road safety in **Bedfordshire**

Bedfordshire residents are being consulted on road safety in a new public survey launched by Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) Festus Akinbusoye















The new survey was launched at the start of May as part of the PCC's latest efforts to bring together a multiagency and transparent approach to community safety concerns.

The survey aims to understand the concerns of the local community and gain the public's perspective on what the force should prioritise when considering road safety.

Commissioned by Bedfordshire's Road Safety Partnership which consists of the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Bedfordshire, Bedfordshire Police, Bedford Borough Council, Luton Borough Council, Central Bedfordshire Council, Bedfordshire Fire and Rescue Service and National Highways, the data gathered will be analysed by road safety research consultancy firm Agilysis.

Mr Akinbusoye said: "As a public service, it's imperative that we give residents the opportunity to have their say on our how Bedfordshire Police deals matters that concern them most.

"Even more important is that the community are confident that their views are not only heard, but acted upon by myself and the Chief Constable.

"This latest survey is just one of the ways I'm working to tackle the causes of crime while ensuring transparent and open communication, as outlined in my Police and Crime Plan.

"I invite residents of Bedfordshire to have their say by completing the survey."

The survey closed on 11 June and a report analysing the data in the survey will be published in due course.

Project: Multi Crime Counselling Pilot

Who are they?

Living Your Life provide a unique and affirmative service in Bedfordshire for people who have been affected by trauma. By trauma, they mean anything that you have experienced that you found traumatic. People can also often benefit from personal development workshops such as those focusing on self-esteem, and coaching.

What is the project about?

To provide therapeutic support options for victims of any crime type except for sexual violence and domestic abuse. Referrals available via Bedfordshire Victim Care Services.

Round up of some of the Commissioners activities in May



Joined two Community Police Officers as they opened one of the weapons amnesty bins in Bedfordshire. Last year, more than 4,100 weapons were handed into the force's 11 weapons bins located across the county – marking the highest number on record.





Welcomed His Majesty's Inspector Roy Wilsher to Bedfordshire Police Headquarters to discuss force performance and share thoughts on areas of improvement. This was following the most recent release of HMICFRS assessment which rated the force as 'Good' at tackling organised crime.

Independent Custody Visitors undertook more than 6,500 visits (an average of 18 visits per day over the year)

Independent Custody Visitors interacted with over 21,000 detainees (an average of 58 people visited, observed or spoken to a day for the year) and provided some form of alternative monitoring for an additional 7,200 people in custody

Independent Custody Visitors spent more than 13,000 hours monitoring detainee dignity and safety

Volunteering and other opportunities

There are a number of volunteering opportunities at the Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner for Bedfordshire.

Independent Custody Visiting

Independent Custody Visitors are members of the local community who, working in pairs, call at Police Custody Suites unannounced at any time. With agreement, the visitors can speak to detainees about their treatment or conditions, and take up any issues of concern with custody staff.

Scrutiny Panel - Stop and Search and Use of Force

The Scrutiny Panel review Stop and Search and Use of Force data, outcomes and also reviews body worn footage recorded to scrutinise use of the power. Panel members attend quarterly meetings which are usually held online via Microsoft Teams on an evening.
